

## **Board of Trustees Update:**

1) The work on the windows of the education building is complete. There were quite a few broken windows replaced in addition to the sealing and painting. The building now not only looks better, but it is also more secure and energy efficient.

2) Joey McLaine negotiated a very reasonable contract with ISI Welding and Fabrication to do the structural work on our steeple. ISI was the only contractor who followed through with our requests for bids. The Church Council approved the contract for \$16,500 so this work to secure the steeple can be completed asap as the structural problem with the steeple is a safety issue.

3) The Trustees have also received an estimate from ABC Exteriors to do the necessary work on the exterior of the steeple. The work will involve scaffolding, cleaning all the stone, repointing, caulking, sealing around the stained-glass windows, and sealing the stone. If approved this work will take about one month to complete. The proposal is for \$139,498.00. The Finance Committee and Board of Trustees will have to work together to finalize plans to correct the steeple properly so that it won't leak for the long term so that the next generation of Bethel members won't have to face these expensive repairs again.

4) Members of our congregation have expressed interest in a few other projects that would benefit our church and community but are not currently within our financial means. One is to replace the carillon so we can once again play beautiful music from our steeple. This project will cost just under \$10,000. A second is to replace the fence around our playground with a nicer looking fence. Based on old estimates, this project will likely cost around \$10,000, also. A third is to replace the blinds in the rooms that were not replaced last year for a better and more consistent appearance from Hampton Street. If anyone has an interest in funding one of these projects, please speak to a member of the Board of Trustees.




The Pastor's Bible Study will not meet in the month of July. The study will resume in August

Two of our youth made a presentation to the Church Council in May. They shared the youth group's desire to paint and update the furnishings in our Youth Room for our growing youth ministry. The Church Council responded enthusiastically by designating \$18,750 \* Neuros of unused budgeted expenses (five months of unused



Discipleship Director/Minister salary) for use in the upgrading of the youth room.



The youth held two works days in June. On the first day they hauled off all the junk, worn out furniture, and the pool table (after removing dozens of bolts and using a sledgehammer to break up the slate panels). On the second day they ripped up the old carpet, removed the partition, and took

down the remaining old blinds. Thanks to Joey McLaine and Rob Crawford for helping the youth with this work. The next step is to have the carpet glue removed from the hardwood floor and then to have the floor refinished. It should look great once the work is complete. The youth are currently working with an interior decorator (Marina Crawford) to finalize paint colors and scheme. Once this is complete, the youth will purchase new furnishings. If anyone has a nice pool table they are no longer using, the youth room needs a new one.

The youth are thankful to the church for buying a new bus. The High School UMYF used the bus first, going to Carowinds on June 9. The Middle School UMYF used the new bus on June 27, for their trip to Carowinds. The bus rides very smoothly and the air conditioning is more than adequate. More trips will be scheduled during the summer, as well.

The UMYF blessed Pastor Scott and Teresa at their end of the year pool parties by gifting them with several items for their grandbaby. Pastor Scott and Teresa are very thankful for the youth group's thoughtfulness.

### 2022 SC Conference of the **United Methodist Church Annual Conference**

The 51<sup>st</sup> session of the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church was held virtually from Sunday, June 5 -Monday, June 6. Bethel United Methodist was represented by Tom

Woodward and Sharon Courtney. The theme of this year's conference was "Seeking a More Excellent Way: Trusting, Believing, Knowing God Is with Us."

The final order of business was the Sending Forth and The conference began Sunday afternoon at 2:00 with the Fixing of the Appointments by Bishop Holston. Pastor Clergy Session. The Commissioning Ordination and Scott Wachter returns to Bethel for a 5th year. A service of Remembrance and Thanksgiving was held The formal business session began at 11:00 with a Call to on Monday evening at 7:00, led by Rev. Dr. Robin Dease. Order and a short opening devotion by Bishop Holston. There were reports form Finance, Nominations, Standing Rules, **Donations Being** Connectional Ministries, Ordained Ministry Board, Pension and Health Benefits, Equitable Compensation, The Cabinet, **Accepted for** and the Lay Leader. Some of the key points from these reports **Shoeboxes** include the following:

- The 2023 budget is \$115.6 million, a decrease of 2.1%
- Five churches were closed and two others were merged
- Each church's Trustees should review all liability coverages to assure proper protections due to the increase in lawsuits against churches in our conference
- Ken Nelson was voted to be an Episcopal candidate from the conference
- Approval was given for the camps to have a special, non-budgetary fundraising program for three years to raise money for Asbury Hills, similar to the program for Epworth
- The Orangeburg district was recognized for giving 98% of its apportionments, the highest percentage of all the districts
- The next general conference is scheduled for 2024

2022 SC Annual Conference continued:

During these reports, the approximately 850 attendees voted on around 40 different ballots.

At the end of the meeting, it was announced that the Annual Conference will be held in Greenville for three years beginning in 2024. Next year's conference will again be held at the Florence Convention Center from June 4-8.
