Dear Bethel Church family:

As I write to you, I am making the final preparations for our Maundy Thursday and Easter Sunday worship services while you are reading these words after the services have been held. So we likely have entirely different perspectives about Holy Week. I'm in the midst of the excitement while Holy Week is in your rearview mirror. I'm anticipating. You're remembering.

Our lives are lived in the before and after of many important life events-births, baptisms, Confirmations, weddings, more births, joyous occasions, sad or even tragic events, and ultimately deaths. And depending on where we are on the timeline, our perspectives may be vastly diverse. Sometimes we have already experienced things that help us prepare and at other times we are flying blindly.

Over the years, I've undergone more than my share of surgeries. TWENTY-EIGHT. Some of them were more extensive than others. I recovered from some very quickly while the recovery time for others was quite lengthy. I was in a great deal of pain before several of the surgeries. And I was in more pain after them. But now, as I look back and the pain is only a faint memory, the pluses of having my body working properly far outweigh the inconvenience and pain from surgery and physical therapy.

Unfortunately, I'm on the before side again. My right shoulder decided to tear apart like

my left shoulder did. The pain is debilitating, and my right arm is basically useless. There is no way around the pain of the surgery and recovery. And as strange as it seems, because I know how much better I'll be in a couple of months, I'm looking forward to having the surgery so I can start the healing process. I can say this in spite of the ridiculous pain of climbing the dreaded finger ladder. By the grace of God, I'll get through this and eventually this undesirable time will only be another distant memory.

We seldom really know what's going on in other peoples' lives. I'm guessing there are more than a few of you reading this who are facing worse difficulties of your own. You're dreading some difficult event in your life or the life of someone you love. Remember, you are not alone. In addition to your church family, God is always with you. Be encouraged. I've heard the expression more than once, "What doesn't kill you makes your stronger." I prefer the Bible's message (always!):

Romans 5 Therefore, since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, ² through whom we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand. And we boast in the hope of the glory of God. ³Not only so, but we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering perseverance; ⁴ perseverance, produces character; and character, hope. ⁵And hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us.

Easter has come and gone. But the truth of the resurrection lives on! Wherever you are, rejoice, God is with you.

The Beatitudes receive little attention, lamented novelist Kurt Vonnegut. "But, often with tears in their eyes, [Christians] demand that the Ten Commandments be posted in public buildings. And, of course, that's Moses,

not Jesus. I haven't heard [anyone] demand that the Sermon on the Mount, the Beatitudes, be posted anywhere."

Jesus' Beatitudes have much to teach about selflessness. mourning, peacemaking and more. Jim Berger, author of Being Sermon on the Mount Christians, explains that those teachings were once "viewed as a mandate for the faithful." Post-Reformation, they became less law-like and more of a "liberating directive." Berger writes, "For Jesus, being and doing are inseparable. The Sermon is at once theory and praxis. It is not enough to read it or hear it. Jesus intends it to be how we live."





Keep on Shining!

Charles W. Naylor (1874-1950) was a traveling evangelist until misfortune struck. First a tentpole fell on him as he prepared for a meeting. A year later, a bus accident left him partially paralyzed.

Despite experiencing chronic pain, Naylor became a prolific author and hymnist, dictating almost 150 songs. He often wrote about God's loving care amid adversity. One of his hymns begins:

When the winds of persecution blow, When the streams of hatred tow'rd you flow, When your foes in number seem to grow, Just keep on shining.

"God's comfort in our times of sorrow is not an imaginary thing," Naylor wrote. "It can be so real that it is a balm for our wounded spirits. Having passed through the experience more than once, [I know] how real and vital and sustaining the comfort of God can be."



Report from the Mission Team

Please mark your calendars for June 2, 2024, because the **Bloodmobile** will be back again. They were here a couple of

Sundays ago and had very little business. They were giving money to the donor and money to the Food Pantry. We need to remember many of our church family who are ill and may be in need of a blood donation sometime and the Food Pantry can always use money to buy food.

At each food pantry we have a cart filled with bags of dog and cat food. Sometimes it's the first thing people have asked if we have when they come in the door. We always have dog and cat food-because of FOCCAS-Friends of the Colleton County Animal Shelter. They provide dog and cat food FREE OF CHARGE.

We received a donation from Ebenezer Methodist Church. We are going to use the money to buy "special groceries" for the buggy. Our buggy contains extra food items that aren't placed in the regular food bags. We buy small bags of flour and sugar, Vienna sausages, Pop-Tarts, instant potatoes, soups, corn bread mix, and other items. If you ever wish to donate to the Food Pantry, we would appreciate it.



When it rains

The skeleton flower, a perennial native to Japan, has delicate petals that change from opaque white to almost transparent when wet. After it rains, only the flower's intricate, skeleton-like veins are visible.

When the rains come (and they will!) in our lives, the same can be said. Amid difficulty and struggle, our true selves often become more transparent. During a parenting challenge, criticism might emerge. Or while we tackle a tough work project, impatience might rear its ugly head.

Hosea 6:3 (NLT) proclaims: "Oh, that we might know the Lord! Let us press on to know him. He will respond to us as surely as the arrival of dawn or the coming of rains in early spring." The rains will come. Whether you're experiencing light rain or a downpour, ponder what the water reveals. Then ask God how you can be more open to his work in that area. —Janna Firestone

Superimposed Love

Maybe you've heard how salvation is like a total solar eclipse: God doesn't see our sins because Jesus' holiness covers them completely. Or maybe you've heard how trials can cause an "eclipse of faith."

At WorldChallenge.org, Pastor Gary Wilkerson explains that in Greek, eclipse means "I am absent" or "I cease to exist," because people once thought the gods temporarily extinguished the sun. "For Christians, a 'spiritual eclipse' is a dark hour when God seems to be absent from our lives," Wilkerson writes.

Wilkerson points to Peter being sifted like wheat, Elijah and Jeremiah facing extreme discouragement, and David collapsing morally. Amid Satan's attacks, "God seems completely absent," writes the pastor. "In that dark moment of eclipse, the devil has created such chaos we can't possibly see a way out." During times of testing, Christians must cry out to God and trust his faithfulness.

Completing the eclipse analogy, Wilkerson shares Titus 3:4, the "love of God our Savior appeared" (NIV). The Greek meaning of appeared here is superimposed, he writes. God looks on our fraught-filled times of eclipse and "superimposes his divine love over us."
