Millions of others will be watching the Super Bowl on television, and sponsors of the telecast will pay 7.5 million dollars for a thirty-second commercial.

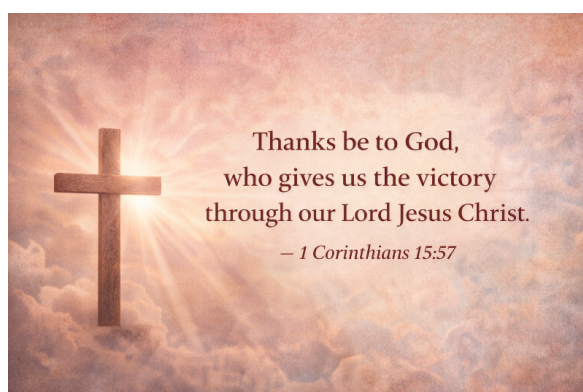
A “Superbowl”, is a game in which the champions and near-champions vie with each other for the most prized award in the National Football League. So, the church is the real Superbowl, where eternal values are matched up against fleeting secular interests. It is the arena with the highest stakes of all, where God's love, mercy and grace are brought to bear upon the human condition.

Christ ultimately is victor, but there are many temporary setbacks, so that the outcome is frequently in doubt. The best of our intentions are left unfulfilled - - the “busted plays” of this life, leave us dazed and confused - - and we are no better than the Apostle Paul who found that he did not do the things he should, and often did the things he should not.

The hour of decision has come, and it is not nearly so important as to the winner of the Superbowl, as it is to determine that Jesus Christ is the Lord of Life. When his all-victorious love has won us over, when we are firmly rooted and fixed in God (as Charles Wesley's hymn suggests), he is the apparent winner - - but that is not the case. We are!

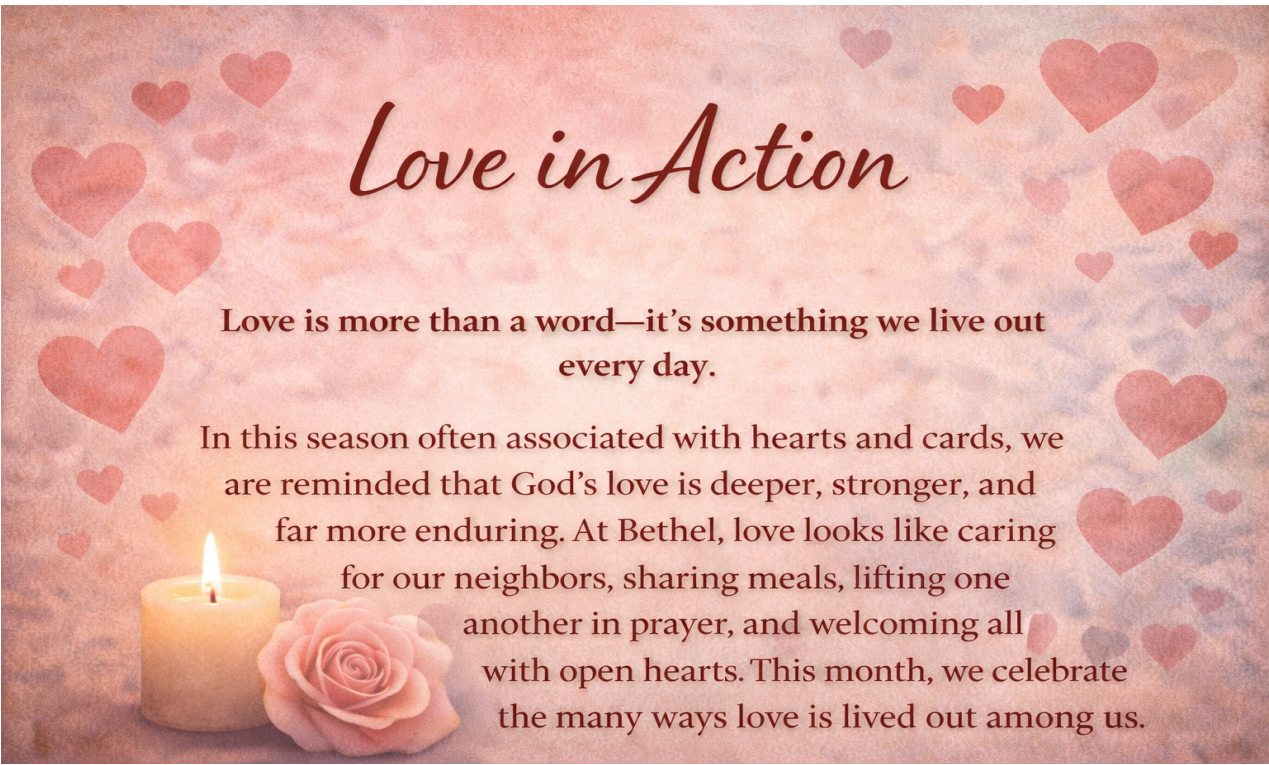
Gathering on Sundays grounds us in something steady when the world feels uncertain. Worship reminds us that we are not meant to walk our faith alone. When we sing together, pray together, and listen for God’s voice together, we strengthen one another in ways that carry us through the week.

Sunday worship is also an act of **love**. Our presence encourages the person sitting nearby. Our prayers lift burdens we may not even see. Simply showing up says, “*You matter, and we belong to one another.*”
